PRIORITIES: What are your top three priorities and why?

Reducing Crime through positive policing programs— Our police force has a negative image and I want to improve that through programs that foster positive encounters with children and adults to develop trust and a more humane police department.

Pedestrian/Bicycle Safety- Right now it is dangerous for bicyclists, children and animals to walk our streets. I will strive to appropriate funds to provide pedestrian-friendly improvements to our roadways.

Green spaces Daily our green spaces and access to waterways are disappearing. We need to protect our parks and offer families, including our four-legged members, access to safe spaces for recreation.

GROWTH: Charleston is experiencing overdevelopment that is pushing people into North Charleston. What is your plan to accommodate growth while keeping neighborhoods intact in North Charleston?

I would support the rapid transit system!
